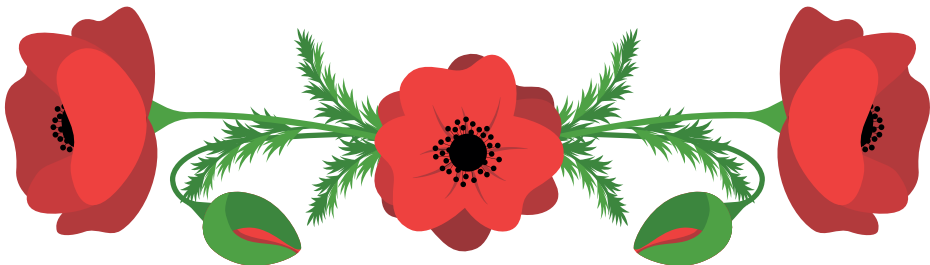

Flanders Field, Ypres

This year marks the 80th Anniversary of a pivotal year in the Second World War. On 4th June 1944, Rome was liberated following a multi-country Allied force victory in the Battle of Monte Cassino, which was one of the bloodiest of the Italian Campaign. Two days later, 6th June, later became known as D Day, as the Allied forces embarked on the largest seaborne invasion in history, beginning the Battle of Normandy, and ultimately the liberation of France and Western Europe. Nottinghamshire Regiments took part in both the Italian Campaign and that in North West Europe during 1944.

In the same year, on the other side of the world, Japanese forces invaded India and pushed back the British 14th Army, the majority of its troops coming from pre-partition India. After weeks of siege and brutal fighting the Japanese forces were defeated in the Battle of Kohima (June) and Imphal (July), in victories which later became the springboard for Allied liberation of Burma. Other troops took part in Operation Market Garden in September of 1944, which was an attempt to secure key bridges in German-occupied Netherlands. In October the Canadian-led Battle of Scheldt successfully liberated the port of Antwerp and meant the Allies were able to open the sea lanes into the Netherlands and Belgium for vital supplies.

Each of these battles was a significant turning point in the war, and each came at a significant cost in casualties, both in terms of those fighting and for families at home.

As we gather today for this Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving, we remember the service and sacrifice of those who fought, and continue to fight, to defend our democratic freedoms. We also give thanks for peacekeepers helping countries to navigate the challenging path from conflict to peace. And we are mindful of the ongoing conflict and escalating violence in Israel, Gaza, Lebanon and Ukraine as well as the many other places where we hope and pray for a more peaceful future.

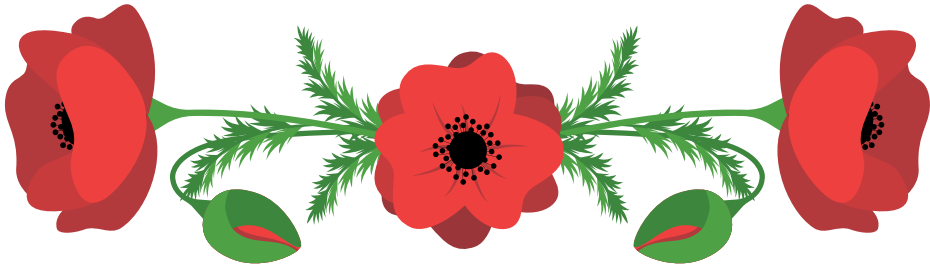
