JOIN US FOR A WEEK OF WONDERFUL WORDS!

This year we are delighted to be welcoming the acclaimed poet and broadcaster Daljit Nagra for our headline event at West Bridgford Library. He'll be sharing his 'desert island poems' in conversation with the Library Director of Bromley House Library, Clare Brown, before reading from his own work, for what promises to be a wonderful evening of poetry.

Sutton-in-Ashfield Library is the venue for a fun event which sees poet Leanne Moden and friends scribing bespoke poems for visitors while they wait. Leanne will also be leading a workshop on reading and writing poetry at Mansfield Central Library.

We'll once again be joined by Writing East Midlands' groundbreaking Beyond the Spectrum project which this year brings us a special taster workshop at Beeston Library for neurodivergent people.

Join poet and director/editor of Nine Arches Press Jane Commane at West Bridgford Library for a workshop which aims to demystify the process of sending your poems out into the world. And Andrew Graves leads a workshop at Stapleford Library where participants will be encouraged to use resources from the library's local heritage collection to inspire their poetry.

Five Leaves joins us at West Bridgford Library for the launch of the ninth and tenth pamphlets in the Five Leaves New Poetry series, and our library-based poetry collective invite us to a showcase of their work at Beeston Library.



Join us for an evening of poetry and jazz with The David 'Stickman' Higgins ensemble at Worksop Library, and enjoy a screening of A Quiet Passion about the life of American poet Emily Dickinson at Southwell Library.

Children from invited schools in Mansfield are set to be inspired by a performance from former Waterstones Children's Laureate Joseph Coelho. There's also the chance to see the Expression exhibition at Mansfield Central Library.

And look out for poetry activities at other libraries – do check at your local library and on their Facebook pages for details about what's happening near you.

We look forward to seeing you for a wonderful week of words.

About Daljit Nagra

Daliit Nagra has a Sikh-Indian heritage and was born and grew up in West London then Sheffield. He is Chair of the Royal Society of Literature, is on the Council of The Society of Authors, is Adviser to Poetry By Heart, and is Professor of English and Creative Writing at Brunel University where he teaches. He has published four poetry collections, all with Faber and Faber, including Look, We Have Coming to Dover! which is one of Faber and Faber's iconic books of the past 90 years. He has won the Forward Prize for Best Individual Poem and Best First Book, the South Bank Show Decibel Award. the Cholmondeley Award, and the Royal Society of Arts Travelling Scholarship. His books have been nominated for the Costa Prize and twice for the TS Eliot Prize. He has been selected as a New Generation Poet by the Poetry Book Society.

As the inaugural Poet-in-Residence for Radio 4 and 4 Extra, he presents the weekly programme, Poetry Extra, on Radio 4 Extra. He has judged many prizes including The Samuel Johnson Prize, The TS Eliot Prize, The Costa Prize, and the David Cohen Prize. His poems have been published in The New Yorker, Poetry Chicago, The LRB, The TLS and The New Statesman. He has written for The Guardian, The Financial Times and The Times of India. His poems are set texts at GCSE and A Level. He is an honorary fellow at Homerton College, University of Cambridge, and at Queen Mary University of London. He is a member of the European Alliance of Academies.



About Clare Brown

Clare Brown's professional background is in arts management, initially working in theatre before becoming Director of the Poetry Book Society (PBS) in 1996. Running the PBS enabled her to develop her passion for reading poetry, started in childhood

particularly when organising the annual TS Eliot Prize readings and award ceremony. She left the organisation and moved to Nottingham in 2003, at around the time Daljit Nagra won the first Poetry Book Society Pamphlet Choice Award. She has two novels published with Bloomsbury in the UK and one with Hachette in France, and freelanced for several years as a writer, consultant and workshop leader until joining Inspire Libraries' Culture team in 2016. She has been Library Director of Bromley House Library since September 2022.

About Jane Commane





Julie Gardner is an ex-primary school teacher who enrolled on a Creative Writing MA when she retired and liked it so much she's now studying for a PhD. She will read from her collection of poems about human connections, written for her granddaughters in the hope that they will read them and know she loved and was loved. The collection includes a series of poems about her half-sister who she has never met, and her husband who died several years ago.

Julie Burke worked as an au pair, toy maker, library assistant, biscuit inspector, sandwich vendor and balloon-shopkeeper before at last returning to her native Nottingham. Her poems have appeared in many magazines, as well as in anthologies, exhibitions, websites, a podcast - even on a building. The poems in her pamphlet *Kindling* flicker with the people, places and all those little things that spark stories from the embers of unreliable memory.

In 2024 he was awarded an OBE for his services to the arts, children's reading and literature. His novel *The Boy Lost in the Maze* (Otter-Barry Books) won the Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing.

As part of his laureateship Joe completed a library marathon around the country joining 213 libraries.

His work has poetry and performance at its heart, drawing on over 20 years' experience running dynamic creative literacy sessions. He aims to inspire young people through stories and characters they can recognise.

About David 'Stickman' Higgins

Jazz and improvisation are formative and enduring imperatives for Dave 'Stickman' Higgins, whose artistic expressions embrace poetry, percussion and performance. His poetry themes draw on his heritage - mum from Barbados, dad from Bury (Lancs), his life influences, healing and community.

Dave is a jazz poet, using his innate sense of rhythm and pulse, and love of syncopation and improvisation that add to the elements of surprise in both jazz and poetry. In the late 1980s, he toured internationally as the drummer with Kalima, a band promoted by Manchester's famous Factory Records and part of the acid jazz scene in London at the time.

Family tragedy, linked to a racial injustice, was an epiphany for Dave, who promptly dropped his career in construction. He embarked on a truth-seeking, compulsively creative artistic venture – and has never stopped. He's contributed to numerous poetry anthologies and works extensively in education contexts where he's created stimulating poetry resources.
